S2 would love to go back to the centre to find out more about the journeys of these refugees and asylum seekers.



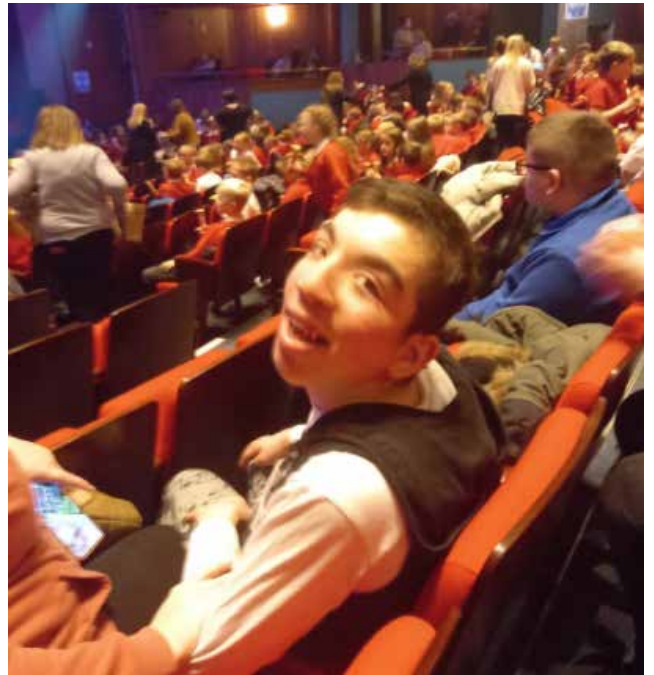
Aladdin

The class really enjoyed learning about life during WW1. They learned exactly what life was like in the trenches and what jobs would have been available at the time. They then also looked at what roles may be needed in a museum and began discussions about what they would enjoy about this role, what skills they would need and what the challenges may be.

When visiting the Museum, they then got to see those roles in action while having a tour around the museum and the café. This also gave them a good understanding of the difference in jobs and life between WW1 and now, realising how Hartlepool has changed.

The learners also raised money to purchase their own wreaths to lay while taking part in the Remembrance Day ceremony at the Cenotaph on Sunday 14th November. They held a 2-minute silence, followed by the Remembrance Day parade.

We hope to continue with this link and work towards a take-over day, with the learners getting the chance to work in the museum itself. This has been a brilliant opportunity to build confidence, communication skills and experience different working environments.

The STEPs Group 2 learners have had a tour of the amazing NeVR Labs this term and were then lucky enough to have a two-hour workshop, where they were able to experience everything virtual NeVR Labs had to offer. The learners had the opportunity to communicate with unfamiliar people, in a new environment, trying several new things. These skills are all part of our ENTERPRISE/CORRECT skills which the learners transfer into the world of work. The NeVR Labs was created by Alice House Hospice to raise funds and to build a community of gamers and non-gamers alike. The staff couldn't have been more accommodating and welcoming to our learners and gave them an opportunity they will never forget. This fantastic facility can be booked out by the general public and has sessions available during the evening and on a weekend.
