the machines work and how they are able to
separate materials, and the different job roles
and progression opportunities available to
employees who work there. The morning was
very interesting and all students looked the

Students from S3, S4 and Link 2 had the opportunity to participate in a literacy workshop organised by Creative Arts teacher, Mrs Kung and run by Caroline Shilson, based at the Museum of Hartlepool. When I am there I don' feel down


Malachy's Journey Continues

Artrium

KS4 Creative Arts students visited the Hartlepool art therapy charity 'Artrium'. Artrium is a mental health charity based in Hartlepool, they use art as a medium to improve wellbeing, working with groups of adults looking to use their time creatively to boost their mental health. The students explore a range of contemporary artist work and chatted to volunteers about the benefits of art for mental health.



The collection of work inspired students to think of creative ways and share positive ideas around helping themselves and others to maintain good mental health. The volunteers were fantastic in the Artrium and were very welcoming. The students loved the wide range of artwork that much they contributed to the charity by buying some artist badges.

Fire Safety

NHS Careers



Suzanne Coyle-Watson, an NHS Careers Co-Ordinator based at North Tees Hospital, has visited Sixth Form and Key Stage 3 & 4 to speak to our students about Health and Social Care careers. Suzanne spoke to us about her own varied career in the NHS and also discussed the career opportunities available to our students. The students learnt a lot about what they could offer the NHS and how rewarding working for the NHS could be for them. They were also given the opportunity to ask Suzanne questions. This was a fantastic experience and inspired the students to further explore their options after school and 6th Form.

After learning that the NHS has over 350 different roles available within the organisation Key Stage 3 & 4 are looking forward to their planned visit in the New Year to the University Hospital of Hartelpool to see first hand the fantastic work that our NHS do for us.



Link 6 - Work Related Learning

Link 6 have worked superbly during Work Related Learning to develop their own sugar skull design; applying their understanding of aesthetic features associated with the 'Day of the Dead' festival costumes. They have used the sublimation printing technique to bring their beautiful hand drawings to life. Students have also explored the properties of materials and how we need to be considerate of the environment when developing ideas for manufacture.

Askham Bryan College





Link 3 visited Askham Bryan as part of their work-related learning sessions in Horticulture. Students were interested in a range of outdoor jobs that we had discussed in class and wanted to learn how they might pursue further education or training in this area. Staff from Askham Bryan took students on a tour of the campus and spoke to them about what courses they offer and how their courses are structured. Students had the opportunity to see snakes, monkeys and birds and get up close and personal with some of the animals they could learn how to care for. In addition, they discussed different areas of outdoor employment and visited an active horticulture area within the grounds.




Halloween Fun at the Academy




Catcote Metro

Hydrotherapy at Futures


After over 2 years fundraising and lots of planning, we are very proud to finally have a new hydrotherapy pool at Catcote Futures.

Our old Jacuzzi pool fell into a state of disrepair during the Covid pandemic and was consequently condemned. Although very disappointing, this was the catalyst we needed to start working towards creating a brand-new purpose-built Hydrotherapy Pool, bespoke to the needs of our learners. Lots of people have been involved with fundraising, researching designs and organising contractors, for which we are very thankful.

The big difference between hydrotherapy versus land based physiotherapy is the elimination of pain. The warm water, high air temperature and relief of body weight combine to deliver this. For many disabled people, who frequently live with pain all the time, their first session in a hydrotherapy pool can be their first time without pain. Free from callipers, pain and gravity, users manage to move in ways that they cannot on land. Their exercises become more intensive and new movements are learned. These can be transferred to their everyday lives. Other benefits include;

- relief of muscle spasm
- maintenance or increase in range of motion of joints
- strengthening of weak muscles and an increase in tolerance to exercise the re-education of paralysed muscles
- improvement of circulation
- encouragement of functional activities
- maintenance and improvement of balance, co-ordination and posture

The skills learned in the pool can be transferred to everyday life as the muscles become accustomed to the movement or the message to the brain developed.


Wintertide 2023
